COVID Era Tour of the Arts a Big Success

This year's Tour of the Arts was our 17th TOA, and perhaps the most unusual, featuring hand sanitizer, face masks and COVID tracking. But it all worked out. Some artists had their best year of sales, others had their highest attendance. Visitors came from Billings, the Flathead and the Bitterroot



Valleys. Typically, the Swan Valley features the most artists, but all the Swan Valley sites chose to play it totally safe during the pandemic. By contrast, the Tour had three new sites in Seeley Lake -Gallery 83, The Stubborn Moose and Willow Creek Studio.

Four Lincoln artists, Gwendolyn Hendricks, Tammy Jordan and Sally Bogaert, demonstrated their weaving, jewelry and crafts at a new gallery/ general store called The Heritage House. Blackfoot Pathways, Lincoln's international sculpture park, joined the tour for the first time, and their parking lot was full to overflowing.



Scott Thompson at Willow Creek Studio drew a nice crowd for his afternoon chain saw carving demonstration and wood sculpture artist Will Katz demonstrated his skills at the Grizzly Claw. Patti Chamberlin demonstrated pine needle weaving and Kris Gullikson painted at Gallery 83. Paula Smith showed her sublimination techniques and Carrie Darrah her pottery at The Stubborn Moose. Diane Whitehead and Angela Williams held down the Brand Bar Museum, welcoming over 90 visitors.

Open Book Club wins Montana Center for the Book Prize

The roots of AAI's Open Book Club (OBC) go back to 2007 when Dee Baker first hosted a book signing at his Grizzly Claw Trading Co. in Seeley Lake. That drew a small crowd, but interest grew gradually when experienced book seller Sara Wilcox came on board at the Grizzly Claw. Soon after Alpine Artisans joined the partnership to build this successful author reading series. The OBC now can draw from 30 to 90 people! In September, the Open Book Club was named one of 3 winners of the Montana Center for the Book Prize. Sponsored by Humanities Montana, the Montana Center for the Book Prize recognizes programs that support literacy, celebrate literature and give people increased access to books and writers. Humanities Montana Executive Director, Randi Tanglen, came to the

Grizzly Claw to present the OBC team with a plaque and a \$1,000 check. The people who make this happen, pictured above, include Michael Cropper, Martha Swanson, Sara Wilcox, Jeanne Koester, Betty Vanderwielen and Susan and Dee Baker.

Tanglen stated, "The MCB Advisory Committee was impressed with the longevity of the Open Book Club, the steady growth and the caliber of authors who have been featured over the years. Bringing over 100 authors to Seeley Lake over these 13 years is amazing!".

The Open Book Club has drawn authors from across the Northwest, including Elizabeth Rosner, Jamie Ford, Bill Kittredge, Victor Charlo, Gretel Ehrlich, Annick Smith, Peter Stark, Henry Real Bird, and Dee McNamer. Many events begin with a Seeley-Swan High School student reading their published poetry. Exposure to professional writers is a highlight for these students and a beloved experience for all the audience members who attend. "In my experience, reading for the Open Book Club has been such an amazing opportunity because it gives young writers stage time and experience," stated Kyle Peltier, SSHS araduate. Authors have done residencies in the schools as well, including a full day residency with Henry Real Bird in Seeley Lake Elementary and Seeley Swan High School. The other two Book Prize winners were literary programs in Billings and Belgrade. The Open Book Club is on hiatus during the COVID-19 pandemic, but we look forward to welcoming authors as soon as we can gather together safely!

Wild at Heart, a celebration of one young girl's unforgettable hike into the wilderness. Along the trail, she and her family are in awe of all that nature has to offer. Each experience delights the senses from meeting a hummingbird, to savoring juicy huckleberries, to fishing a mountain lake, to climbing a mountain peak for the first time. Throughout this original story, the young girl's kinship with nature is palpable. The lovingly rendered watercolor

Lamar explains the inspiration for her fourth children's book: "One fine August weekend, my husband and I donned our heavy backpacks and herded our young children along the trail to Hemlock Lake in the Mission Mountains Wilderness. Our eight-year-old daughter carried a small backpack with her doll, books, and rain jacket. Our five-year-old son was too big to carry, and too young to hike very far. We took our time

as we coaxed our children along, stopping to look at every little curiosity along the trail. Luckily, the huckleberries were ripe and plentiful along it. The anticipation of berries ahead was a good incentive to keep our kids moving."

At first glance, the pages within Wild at Heart simply tell the story of a family's backpack trip. Upon closer examination, it reveals the timeless tale of the connection between nature

and child. This book belongs in the collection of anyone who is interested in connecting children to nature: including librarians, teachers, parents and grandparents. NEW ROLLING DEADLINE FOR AAI YOUTH GRANTS

Alpine Artisans is pleased to announce a substantial change to the Youth Grant program application process. We are eliminating the spring application deadline and opening the application period to include the entire school year (fall through spring). Beginning this fall, K-12 students attending schools, or home-schooled, in the Blackfoot and Seeley-Swan Valleys are able to apply for grants up to \$300 to support tuition and expenses for instruction in the arts (art, graphic design, drama, dance, creative writing, film making or music), including workshops, camps, or lessons. This rolling deadline will allow students greater flexibility in finding instruction. Students may receive a Youth Grant up to a maximum of three times.
